Where is the Gold Coast?

The Gold Coast is tucked into the south-east corner of Queensland, Australia, just over an hour's drive (80 km) south of Brisbane. It hugs the Pacific Ocean, with famous beaches on one side and lush hinterland on the other.

What airport do I fly into to visit the Gold Coast?

Fly into Gold Coast Airport (OOL) at Coolangatta, just a 30-minute drive from Surfers Paradise. Alternatively, you can fly into Brisbane Airport and drive or catch the train down.

How to get around the Gold Coast?

Getting around is a breeze thanks to the G:link light rail (which runs from Helensvale to Broadbeach), a reliable bus network, plus taxis, rideshares, and plenty of bike paths along the beach.

To get here from Brisbane you can:

- Drive: Just over an hour via the M1.
- Catch the train: From Brisbane Airport or Central Station, ride the train to Helensvale then hop on the G:link tram to head towards Surfers Paradise and beyond.

 Bus: Various coach and shuttle services run from Brisbane to the Gold Coast, including direct airport transfers.

If you're planning day trips into the hinterland or exploring beyond, hiring a car can be handy.



Top Tips for Residents and Tourists

Summer is the high season for tourism as millions of vacationers head for beaches, historical sites and museums all over the world. Traveling is an amazing thing: an opportunity to learn new things, see new places and meet new people. However, as with most amazing things there are drawbacks. We have to leave our habitual routines and comfort zones, air travel can be stressful – particularly with children – and there's quite a lot of crime targeting specifically tourists and foreign visitors.

I can boast being rather a seasoned traveler. I average some 100 flights a year and know quite a bit about the perks and perils of life on the go. We live in an increasingly computerized world and our digital footprint has been rapidly growing over the last decade or two. The result is that as many as 18% of the travelers we surveyed have had problems caused by cybercrime while abroad. This is three times more than the number of who suffered physical crimes against them while away from home. And that's why I want to share some digital-security tips for tourists and travelers going abroad:

Tip No. 1: Take an extra debit card with a low balance and some local cash with you

When travelling abroad you often simply can't be completely sure it's safe to use your regular credit or debit card. A waiter in a restaurant in a distant land may carry it away with him (although this is increasingly rare) to scan it to pay your bill, or inserts it into a suspicious-looking point-of-sale (POS) device. Criminals attach bank card skimmers to ATMs or POS devices and they're not easy to spot. We know of cases where criminals turn ATMs themselves into skimmers: they infect the cash machines and make them collect the bank credentials of the customers who use them. And it's impossible to distinguish an infected ATM from a clean one.

I suggest carrying an extra debit card with you with just a small amount of funds available on it, and to use only it in any situation where your card is more likely to be compromised than usual. Small shops, restaurants, an obscure ATM at night... And I also prefer carrying a small amount of local cash with me as often you find bank cards simply aren't accepted in a lot of places.

Tip No. 2: Use a VPN for unknown Wi-Fi networks

Let's admit it: many of us use unprotected Wi-Fi networks when we travel. Doing so is now second nature to most of us, and anyway sometimes there's no other choice. But are you aware that it's easy for cybercriminals to sniff your traffic if you're using an insecure network with weak encryption or without it? The first thing I do when I get online on such a network is connect to my company's virtual private network (VPN), which encrypts all my online communications.

Tip No. 3: Be VERY cautious with hotel business center computers

I'd much prefer to recommend never using public computers, but I understand that sometimes they're impossible to avoid. If you have to print something out really urgently, what else are you going to do? The problem is that using public computers can easily go horribly wrong.



The first issue is that people often don't realize what sort of traces (passwords saved, accounts logged in, etc. to name the most obvious) they leave. I've heard a story of someone finding documents marked 'TOP SECRET' in the 'Downloads' folder on a public computer in a hotel somewhere in the Middle East! If those were real documents, clearly someone with very poor computer security hygiene standards had left them there. Or maybe it was a cunning ploy to make people copy the files – which contained some advanced and invisible malware? We'll never know. Incidentally, the guy who told me the story said he immediately became paranoid and really wanted to 'un-see' the files.

The second issue is that hotel computers may be already infected. There have been reports of criminals installing keylogging malware in several American hotel networks to collect guests' credentials and steal their valuable data.

In short: using public computers for anything besides reading the news or printing something not too confidential is a bad idea.

Tip No. 4: Protect your devices with passwords and backup before you leave

While traveling people sometimes lose their stuff – including their smartphones, tablets and laptops. Often the data stored on a lost device is more valuable than the device itself. It's possible to minimize the damage by backing up all your data, encrypting the hard drive, and

using a strong password. I also recommend using anti-theft apps that can help locate the device, or at least wipe (remotely) all the data on it if it's lost for good.

Tip No. 5: Don't overshare

Many people share large troves of personal data on social networks. I strongly advise against doing so. Various scammers can use this data to hack into personal accounts and steal data or money from bank accounts. And posting vacation photos while still on vacation is asking for trouble: potential burglars see you're thousands of miles away and simply break into your home. So those are my top-five tips for when traveling abroad. (They're in addition to the basic all-round guidelines, like keeping all software up to date, using a good security solution, and not following suspicious links or opening dubious attachments.) They're all simple and easy to follow, so there's really no excuse! However, just remember: there's no such thing as absolute security, either online or offline. So at least observing basic computer security hygiene — especially while on holiday when the risks can be greater and your vigilance lower — is the bare minimum we should all aim for to minimize the risks. Be smart. And don't be an easy target for cybercriminals.
