What a Safe Actually Needs to Protect Against

Burglary is the obvious threat, but it's rarely the only one. Fire resistance matters just as much, since paper documents, passports, and electronics are destroyed at far lower temperatures than most people assume. A safe rated for both impact resistance and a specific fire duration — commonly 30 minutes to two hours — gives you real protection rather than a locked box that happens to look sturdy. Weight and anchoring matter too, since an unsecured safe can simply be carried out of the house during a break-in, defeating its entire purpose.

Not Every Safe Is Built for the Same Job

A compact [Money Safe Box](#) designed for cash and small valuables is a different product entirely from a larger unit meant to hold files, contracts, and family documents. Cash and jewellery boxes prioritise quick access and discreet placement, often with electronic keypads for fast entry, while document safes are usually larger, heavier, and built with fire resistance as the primary design goal rather than an afterthought. Buying the wrong category for your actual needs is one of the most common mistakes first-time buyers make.

Traditional key or dial locks remain reliable and immune to battery failure, making them a solid backup option even on electronic models, and worth checking for before you buy.
